## MARINA CITY ARCHITECT HONORED



Bertrand Goldberg of Bertrand Goldberg and Associates, designers of Marina City, recently received an award for outstanding achievement in architecture and engineering. The presentation was made by the Junior Association of Commerce at their sixth annual "Chicagoan of the Year" dinner.

## GOODWILL COLLECTION BOOTHS ARE INSTALLED AT MARINA CITY

Goodwill Industries have installed collection booths for depositing used clothing and small household articles in the Marina level of the East and West Towers of Marina City near the passenger elevators.
